On this day in history (August 31)....

1837 Ralph Waldo Emerson gives his famous "The American Scholar" speech to Phi Beta Kappa Society at Harvard College, Cambridge, Massachusetts, declares American literary independence from Europe

1888 The body of Jack the Ripper's first victim, Mary Ann Nichols, is found in Whitechapel in London's East End

1897 Thomas Edison patents the Kinetoscope [kinetographic camera], a device which produces moving pictures

1935 1st national skeet championship (Indianapolis)

1935 FDR signs an act prohibiting export of US arms to belligerents

1940 US National Guard assembles



1946 Foghorn Leghorn, Warner Bros. cartoon character created by Robert McKimson and Warren Foster, (Looney Tunes and Merrie Melodies series), first debuts in "Walky Talky Hawky"

1951 1st 33 1/3 album introduced in Dusseldorf 1955 1st sun-powered automobile demonstrated (Chicago, Illinois)

1971 Beatle John Lennon leaves England for the final time, moving to New York City

1987 The Great Potato Incident: Minor league Williamsport Bills catcher Dave Bresnahan attempts to lure an opposing baserunner off third base using a potato carved to look like a baseball. Umpire calls runner safe, and the catcher is fined \$50 and released by the team

1990 Baseball outfielders Ken Griffey and Ken Griffey Jr. become the 1st father and son to play on same team (Seattle Mariners), the pair hit backto-back singles in the first inning and both scored 1994 Pentium computer beats world chess champ Garry Kasparov

1997 Diana, Princess of Wales, dies in a car crash in a road tunnel in Paris


2009 The Walt Disney Company announces it will acquire Marvel Entertainment for \$4.24 billion

COVID Pay Update

As COVID has become more endemic and the population (including the CDC) treats it like a common illness the need for COVID Pay policies are no longer necessary

- We will continue to abide by CDC guidelines and applicable state and/or federal regulations
- Isolation Only required for Positive COVID cases (up to 5 Days of isolation no change; can use contractual absence options such as vacation, etc.)
- Quarantine No longer required based on current CDC guidelines
- Test Waiting Testing readily available in the community; employee responsibility; no "wait pay"

We will treat positive COVID more like other illnesses but excuse up to 5 days off for CDC recommended isolation

- Employees who have a positive COVID test should isolate per guidance of their medical professional and contact Medical Department to report the positive test
- On return-to-work employee needs to provide positive test result GM Medical to be excused
- Employees will be subject to Doc 8 if they fail to call in and provide positive test result on their return





HISTORY OF NATIONAL FOOD BANK DAY

St. Mary's Food Bank Alliance is a nonprofit, nonsectarian organization that was founded by John van Hengel in 1967. Van Hegel was looking for a way to prevent the wastage of groceries and eventually came up with the idea of redistributing any food that was not eaten to the hungry. St Mary's was the first organization to operate using the food bank model. It is considered the first food bank, making St. Mary's a pioneer in the food banking system. The organization has been successfully alleviating hunger for almost 50 years. This idea of food banks spread and many other food banks were created across the country.

Van Hengel continued his work and founded other food banks as well as the national organization America's Second Harvest — known today as Feeding America. He also founded the Global Food Banking Network and has since been known as "the father of food banking." National Food Bank Day was selected on behalf of Van Hengel to commemorate his extraordinary works.

In September 2000, world leaders established Millennium Development Goals and they signed a commitment to achieve them by 2015. The first goal was to end extreme poverty and hunger. They also specified three targets: The first was to halve the proportion of people who suffer from hunger by 2015. The second was to decrease the likelihood of a child dying before age five due to hunger and finally the third was to reduce the rate of extreme poverty. About 40 countries have already achieved the first target and extreme poverty rates have been cut in half since 1990. Food banks are a key component in the realization of these goals. In the U.S. alone, about 42 million people struggle with food insecurity and food banks are helping these people.

5 FACTS ABOUT HUNGER

Hunger is a growing problem

Hunger is the world's biggest health problem, with about 42 million

people facing food insecurity.

Women are affected more than men

Women make up approximately 60% of the world's population facing hungry.

Malnutrition is causing high mortality

Children under five are susceptible to starvation, and almost five million die of malnourishment.

There are millions of starving Americans - A Study released in 2013 found that about 49.1 million Americans were struggling with hunger — 33.3 million adults and 15.8 million children.
